

GENERAL MANAGER UPDATE



The atmosphere in the classroom and school building contribute to student success. To help prepare for the work, Talisa asked herself, "What would help me learn better in this class?"

Greeting students daily with "?áy tit sq'ítačl" (Good day) using Chehalis language to communicate and singing a morning song for our middle and high school students are some of the ways Talisa creates comfort and rapport with students.

She helps teachers understand the difference between Treaty Tribes and Executive Order Tribes and why that is important. An example is when the third grade was working on a social studies/ history writing project. The thirdgrade teacher requested resources from Talisa, who shared specific Chehalis Tribe histories and real histories from "The Chehalis People" book.

Talisa also requests Chehalis tribal departments visit schools to provide educational opportunities. The Chehalis Tribal Loan Fund was asked to work with students in the Oakville School District. Plant medicine will be facilitated with students through the Tribal Connections grant.

What motivated you to apply for the position of Indian Education Coordinator at Oakville School District?

Working for the students is my biggest motivation. Growing up in Taholah, I had a wonderful cultural educator, Ms. Mice. She worked with her students and built those cultural skills through language, weaving, songs and stories and ethnobotanical knowledge. She taught us what to eat and what to gather.

"As an adult, I ensure my children know the importance of their culture and heritage. They know what to gather at each time of year here in Chehalis. These are things I share with students when they ask. She was the one who taught me who I am and where I come from. That is a powerful feeling," she said.

Do you have a vision for your service to students?

Talisa's goals for her life's work are to:

- Leave the young ones with all the knowledge that she has, to help the culture stay alive.
- Support the students' choices 100%
 - Make sure students have

one of the three Es planned to guide them after graduation (enrollment, employment and enlistment).

"I believe in every student's ability to succeed in the paths they choose. I encourage them to follow their dreams. I see potential in all the students and truly want the best for all of them," Talisa said.

Do you have any advice for students, parents or other educators?

Talisa explained that attendance is very important for success in school. She said when students are present, they can receive support and enrichment to help them grow and learn.

Oakville School District is grateful that the community trusts us to provide education, safety and culture for their children, and we take that very seriously," she said.

Marie E. Connors (Fricke) Griswold

July 22, 1930-Jan. 13, 2024

Chehalis tribal elder Marie E. Connors (Fricke) Griswold passed away on Jan. 13, 2024, at age 93.

Marie was born on July 22, 1930, at home in Oakville. She had five sisters – Mae, Barbara, Geraldine, Alberta, Delores – all of whom proceeded her in death.

Marie was active in tribal politics her entire adult life. She was instrumental in the creation of the tribe's first casino. She talked about

the many tribal discussions and careful planning that took place before building commenced and the doors opened.

In the early days, Marie managed the tribal bingo hall and sat on the Tribal Gaming Board. She also served on the Tribal Health Board.



After

retirement, Marie enjoyed basketry. She gathered with other elders to learn more weaving skills, share her skills and techniques and swap stories about early days on the reservation. She enjoyed her trips to gather weaving materials.

Marie's home was always filled with drying grasses and cedar bark. For a short while, she was a member of the Native American Basket Weaver's Association.

Marie was also fond of playing bingo with friends and spending time at the casino with her husband, Ray.

On casino days, she always had lunch with the elders. Stories were told and laughter was shared.

Marie enjoyed traveling with the elders. A definite highlight was when she attended the Seattle Mariners baseball training camp in Arizona.

Besides her sisters, Marie was proceeded in death by her first husband, Allen Fricke, mother Gertrude Parson Connors and father George Edward Connors.

She is survived by her three children, Linda, Allen and Laura. She is also survived by her husband, Ray Griswold, and his daughters Cindy and Kim. Marie leaves numerous grandchildren, great grandchildren and nieces and nephews.

Marie was laid to rest at a graveside service on Jan. 23, 2024, in the Benn Cemetery. Frances Starr conducted the service.

Patricia Lee Youckton, age 55, a lifelong resident of the Chehalis Reservation, died on Jan. 12, 2024, at Providence St. Peter Hospital in Olympia. Pat was born on Feb. 28, 1968, in McCleary to David Merle and Wendy Cecilia (Daniels) Youckton. She lived in Las Vegas and Tacoma for short periods, but she always came back to her roots. She graduated from Oakville High School in 1986.

Patty liked to hustle to make her living. She became a salesperson extraordinaire and found her passion in selling fireworks. She made various friends through that endeavor. Patty had many friends from all walks of life. It seemed every time she walked into a place, she knew someone. It was sort of like Cheers: "Where everybody knows your name." That was Patty.

Patty never had children of her own, but that didn't stop her from passing on a mother's love to her nephews and nieces. For them, her love knew no boundaries.

She was a lifelong Seahawks fan and became a season ticket holder. During the Hawks' power seasons, she traveled to various away games. Patty loved to play slot machines. She and her family would travel a lot. Many trips were to Vegas, Disneyland and even San Diego. Her television was often tuned into a game. It didn't matter what it was – WNBA, college games, Kraken – she just loved to watch sports.

During the past few years, Patty battled cancer. In the end, it was a battle she lost. Even though she was sick from treatment and side effects, her open, caring side shone through.

He taught both in public and Native American schools in Washington and Montana. He retired from teaching in January 2023. He loved sharing his knowledge with enthusiastic minds. He helped several young students enter secondary education in the automotive field.


