The Chehalis Tribal Business Committee honored three of the Tribe's longtime employees who will retire during December and early January:

- Chehalis Tribal member Amil Starr made the decision to retire this year. His official last day working for the Tribe was the day of the Christmas Party. He was honored with a Pendleton blanket.
- Don Terry was acknowledged and honored with a Pendleton Blanket. During his decades of employment, he has been involved with many projects that have positively impacted the progressio of the Chehalis Tribe. Terry was familiar with the Chehalis Tribal people when he was a child growing up in the 1970s because his father worked in the timber industry and had a working relationship with the Quinault and Chehalis Tribal people. Terry started working for the Tribe as a contractor in 1994 when he was part of various projects on the reservation, including building the Fish House and remodeling the old Youth Center (now part of Head Start). He was hired as a full-time employee for the Chehalis Tribe in 2006. Terry is known to go above and beyond as he became a part of the Tribal community during his 30 years working on the reservation. He is known to provide a helping hand or advice to Tribal members who need any type of assistance with their homes.
- Harold Chesnin, Lead Attorney for the Chehalis Tribal Government, will also retire after nearly five decades working with and for the Chehalis Tribe. He has worked among the Chehalis Tribal people since 1976. During his time with the Office of Tribal Affairs, Chesnin has obtained a wealth of knowledge regarding Tribal history and sovereignty. During the party, Chesnin said the Chehalis Tribal people are a caring community that takes care of one another. "The people are wonderful," Chesnin said. "It has been my great honor to serve you." Harold finished by formally announcing to the rest of the employees that Robbi Kesler will be the next Lead Attorney.

Business Committee members took time to thank the rest of the employees for their hard work and dedication throughout the year.

After the employee recognition, Wayne Barr was asked to say a prayer for the holiday meal. Events staff conducted raffle drawings during the rest of the party.

Elders learn fire safety tips

On Dec. 3, Chehalis Tribal Emergency Management Manager Clinton Davis and Coordinator Cal Bray provided Tribal Elders important fire safety information.

Davis and Bray educated 28 Lunch & Learn participants on fire prevention during the busy holiday season. They demonstrated how to use a fire blanket and handed out backpacks with emergency kit basics.

Classes of fires were explained:

- Class A fire caused by combustible carbon-based solids such as paper, wood or textiles
- Class B fire caused by flammable liquids such as paraffin, petrol, diesel or oil (but not cooking oil)
- Class C fire caused by flammable gases such as butane, propane or methane

Suggestions regarding securing a fire extinguisher included making sure it is A, B and C rated and is light enough for an Elder to lift. Smaller extinguishers that have the combined rating are lighter and more manageable.

The visit was timely and offered information to help families be prepared.



SAFEGUARD YOUR HOME

Alarms: Install smoke alarms on every level of your home and outside each sleeping area. Place a carbon monoxide alarm in a central location outside each sleeping area.

House number: It's crucial that emergency personnel can easily read your house number from the street, even at night.

Ensure heating sources are in working order: Poorly maintained furnaces or stoves, cracked or rusted furnace parts or chimneys with creosote buildup are dangerous.

Check electrical wiring in your home: Fix or replace frayed extension cords, exposed wires or loose plugs. Make sure wiring is not under rugs, attached by nails, or in high traffic areas. Make sure electrical outlets have cover plates and no exposed wiring. Avoid overloading outlets or extension cords.

CTWC moves to electronic records system

The Chehalis Tribal Wellness Center is transitioning to a new Electronic Health Record (EHR) system, EPIC, in 2025. This change is a significant step forward in enhancing our ability to deliver coordinated, efficient and high-quality care. Our pharmacy will continue to operate using RPMS during this transition, which might present temporary challenges.

Benefits of new system

- **■** Better care coordination:
- Health information will be more easily accessible by your care team, improving communication and care.
- Streamlined services: More efficient appointment scheduling, checkins and follow-ups.
- Future access: EPIC will eventually offer online patient portals for easier access to health records.

Potential hindrances

- **■** Coordination between systems:
- Prescriptions might not sync seamlessly between EPIC and RPMS, possibly causing slight delays at the pharmacy.
- Staff learning curve: Our staff will learn to use EPIC while continuing to use RPMS for pharmacy operations, which could lead to temporary inefficiencies.
- Adjustments: Scheduling and other processes might have minor disruptions as we adapt to the new system.

Support, patience

- **Understanding:** We appreciate your patience as we improve our systems.
- **Communicate:** Ensure your care team has up-to-date information (insurance, address, phone number), especially for prescriptions.
- Staff training: Our team is undergoing extensive training to ensure a smooth transition.
- Clear communication: We'll keep you informed of any changes or delays during the transition.
- Feedback: Your input is invaluable. Let us know how we can improve your experience. 


