

# Brick by Brick

**C**hehalis Tribal Loan Fund raised about \$40,000 net through its annual fundraising dinner at 5:30 p.m. Dec. 5 at Great Wolf Lodge.

The Brick by Brick Dinner and Auction supports the organization's mission by allowing it to provide lending to clients and sustain ongoing operations. CTLF is dedicated to "paving the way to financial empowerment through education, coaching and fair lending."

As the event kicked off, many of the 116 participants lined up to receive bidding paddles for the live auction. Tables surrounding the dining room along the walls held silent auction items. People placed bids on the sheets and periodically checked on the action. Big decisions were made as bidders increased their bids or dropped out. Attendees enjoyed appetizers and cocktails.

The Chehalis Tribe Business Committee recently approved a new name for the Briarwood property, qʷáłš̓m.

The name means “people of a village,” “neighbor, company, companion.” It is pronounced Qwah THLshum.

Tribal members voted on the title during a survey at the Annual Meeting. The winning name

received 83 votes.

Tribal Government took ownership of the more than 140 acres in 2024. Natural Resources, Planning and Facilities worked together on a plan to demolish barns, clean up the property and repair and update utilities at the site.

A lot of development will soon be happening at the property.

# Tribal summit focuses on strengthening care

The annual Tribal Initiative Learning Collaborative Summit was held Oct. 22-24 at Great Wolf Lodge Conference Center in Grand Mound.

More than 150 people from five states (Minnesota, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Washington and Wisconsin) convened to represent more than 30 Indian Nations and state partners to share program insights and work cohesively together to strengthen long-term services and supports and home- and community-based services for the tribal nations they serve.

The gathering uplifted tribal voices, honored sovereignty and ensured Tribal Elders and relatives with disabilities receive care that reflects traditional knowledge along with access to modern care.

The focus was on designing and delivering care to restore balance, dignity and choice to our communities.

Brenda Francis Thomas, Regional Manager for Region 3 (north), and Chehalis Tribal member Heather Hoyle, Regional Manager for Region 3 (south), took a break from the Centennial Accord meeting to speak to the group at Great Wolf Lodge.

They emphasized the importance of state, agency and federal partners' recognition of each Tribe's autonomy as sovereign entities in development of service plans and programs.

The summit was an opportunity for many Tribal, state and agency partners to gather and identify and meet the needs of our Tribal members and citizens who might need caregiving in their homes.

Relationships built during the three days energized the commitment to create systems of care that honor the past, meet the needs of the present and prepare for future generations.

# Creative space awaits Native entrepreneurs

## *SPIPA program provides workshop, business guidance*

SPIPA's Entrepreneurial Program held an open house on Nov. 21-22 at its workshop at 6541 Sexton Drive NW, Building G in Olympia.

South Puget Intertribal Planning Agency (SPIPA) is a crucial resource for regional tribes Chehalis, Nisqually, Skokomish, Squaxin Island and Shoalwater Bay. The agency provides financial and technical assistance for tribal members to aid with planning and development.

Enrolled tribal members aspiring to become business owners have access to hands-on coaching. The group has worked with many tribal artists, helping them build profitable businesses.

The program offers a 12-week cohort Ideapreneurship training that teaches participants how to turn their ideas into a realistic plan to enhance marketing, advertising and networking.

Local Native Americans were invited to the open house to discover more about the program and the tools and equipment available for use. Attendees enjoyed highlights of the building, which included the following.

**Podcast Studio:** Available for booking to create high-quality, professional audio for business marketing and storytelling.

**Maker Space:** Shared workshop for prototyping and small-batch product creations.

**Creator Space:** Work area with a sewing machine, serger and quilter.

To be able to use the equipment for business development, you must be an enrolled member of an SPIPA Tribe and have a Washington state business license.

Other services include:

**Individualized consultation:** One-on-one business consultations.

**Dollars & Sense:** Basic budgeting courses, including separating personal and business money and understanding credit and debt.


**EP annual tax event:** Provides free tax services to Native entrepreneurs.

**EP website-building:** Workshop to help launch, manage and update a website.


**More resources and tools** for specific needs/requirements of business owners.



well represented by Aryana Klatush, Brooklyn Klatush, Kahli Reynolds and Madoleen Goddard. It was amazing to hear our language from Madoleen Goddard as she welcomed folks to the gathering.

"We could not do the great work that we do in our community without you," said Chehalis Tribal Loan Fund Executive Director Tamra De Nova. "Did you know that for Native CDFIs, that's what we are – a Native Community Development Financial Institution – every dollar that we put into the community returns to the community \$8. Nice! We were started in 2006 by the Chehalis Tribe. Without their support and the strong foundation that the Tribe itself built, we wouldn't be in our new building either. We wanted to acknowledge that support."

Tamra introduced Chehalis Tribal Chairman Dustin Klatush, who said, "Thank you, Tamra. Thank you all for being here tonight also. They've been doing quite a bit for our Tribe. A lot of my family members have gotten loans from them – fireworks, cars, housing. These guys help a lot through our community, so I just want to thank you for all the hard work that you do. You are amazing people."

Dustin continued: "Congratulations on your new building. It's awesome! I really do miss seeing you walking through every day. I'm going to have to make a trip down to Oakville one

of these days and visit with you again. You know, I just want to thank everybody else that's here to support tonight. Today's a big event. It's one of the biggest events that they have every year. There are a lot of good raffle items out here, good food from the Great Wolf Lodge. This is one of the places that the Tribe owns, too, so I want to thank you for coming to our homeland. I just hope everybody treats our land with respect like you would at your own house. So, thank you again for being here. Thank you, Tamara. Thank you, Kevin and the crew."

## Stories of support

Tamra invited loan recipients to speak about their experiences with CTLF and what the loans allowed them to achieve for themselves and their families.

Allen Bush was up first. "I

was kind of nervous when I went into the loan fund. I'd never done that before. I needed to get some money to get a car, and it was a really smooth and fantastic experience," Allen said. "I'm going back there soon to get another loan. So, thank you for being here."

Next was George Sanchez who said, "Thank you so much for being here. I was nervous, like Allen, to go into the Chehalis Tribal Loan Fund. I really didn't know what I could do. There was a lot of stuff that I needed to get done, like debt consolidation and dealing with the IRS. I mean, they helped me out a lot, and they helped me through the rough times. It was a struggle for the last few years. They helped me with everything that I've built so far in me and my family's life. Thank you."

Jenny and Daniel Crawford are business owners that received help from CTLF. Jenny spoke

about their experience. "I want to begin with how our paths crossed because that story defines why this moment matters so deeply," Jenny said. "Early this year, I was searching for any possible way to help our small business continue serving our members. I found a list of 1,385 community development financial institutions in Washington. Out of the entire list, I emailed about 15 of them. Only one wrote back to me, the Chehalis Tribal Loan Fund. It was not one week later, nor a few days later, but the same day I sent my email. Pierre replied right away, asking what we were facing and what we needed. I remember writing right back immediately to him with so much hope, but also with fear because when you are fighting for something you love, every answer feels like it carries your future. Then he said something that surprised us. He said, 'I can visit you tomorrow.' My husband and I looked at each other. We were very skeptical not because we doubted him but because customer service that genuine, that fast and that human is almost unreal nowadays, but the next day he showed up," Jenny continued.

"And this is where the story becomes bigger than us because our gym – CrossFit Grays Harbor – is not just about workouts or equipment. It's about people. Every day, we watch individuals walk in, unsure of themselves and walk out discovering a strength they didn't know they had. We seek confidence revealed, friendships formed, encouragement restored, rep by rep, day by day and brick by brick. I got that just for tonight though. And when our members become stronger, they take that strength home with them into their children's schools,



their workplaces, into their relationships, into the service roles they have in the community, hospitals, companies, schools – any other services that they have. What begins inside our four walls becomes a stronger community and a stronger workforce. This is why your support matters," Jenny explained.

Tamra thanked sponsors: Chehalis Tribe, Lucky Eagle Casino & Hotel, Elite Mechanical Services, KeyBank and Great Wolf Lodge.

The event's auctioneer extraordinaire Fred Granados said, "Give Tamra a big round of applause everybody. Thank you for all those wonderful stories."

## Wonderful donations

The first item up for bid in the live auction was an etched mirror that went for \$2,100. The mirror was designed by Dakota Marcellay – Phil schwa kalup.

Vicious Ink Tattoo Studio donated \$1,500 worth of tattoo work by artist Brian Garcia to the fundraising effort. It was won by an OBEE Credit Union employee for \$1,050.

**Two Mexican Moments**  
Vacations trips for four guests for four nights, valued at \$6,440, were auctioned to two bidders for \$2,000 each.

A "Business Start Up Kit" valued at more than \$6,000 that included a custom website from SeaWing Design, a laptop, a desk and a monitor raised \$2,100 for the fund. The laptop was donated by George Sharp, keyboard and mouse donated by Fred Meyer and remaining items donated by the CTLF Business Development Program.

Trudy Marcellay – Tsi stah' ble – donated a beautiful cedar basket valued at \$2,000. It was auctioned off for \$1,050.

Elite Mechanical Services donated a mystery box of items worth thousands that raised \$1,300 in the auction.

As the live auction and silent auction concluded, Supaman delivered a dynamic closing performance that blended traditional fancy dancing with hip-hop, filling the room with energy and excitement. His powerful presence had the audience on their feet and made for an unforgettable finale.

# Visitors check out CTLF's new location

More than 50 people walked through Chehalis Tribal Loan Fund's open house from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Nov. 7 at 214 E. Pine St. in Oakville.

Attendees enjoyed snacks, drinks and an official ribbon cutting and blessing. Hot tea hit the spot on the cold and rainy day. Pulled pork sandwiches, potato salad and coleslaw were available, along with cupcakes for dessert. Local favorite Oak Burger provided catering.

CTLF was founded by the Chehalis Tribe in 2007. In 2015, the U.S. Treasury department certified the group as a Native Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI). CTLF now serves 200 active participants.

Programs and services are designed to:

- Build financial confidence
- Provide access to fair lending
- Support personal and business growth
- Help clients become financially strong and empowered to choose the lending institution that best fits their needs.

The organization has loan programs for Chehalis Tribal members, employees of the Tribe and entities and the local community surrounding the reservation. CTLF also serves other Native Americans in southwest Washington for small business development services and loans. Classes and workshops are open to anyone.
