## The Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation

#### Hazard Mitigation Plan 2023 Annual Progress Report

Reporting Period: 1/2023-12/2023

#### Background:

The Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation developed a hazard mitigation plan to reduce risk from all hazards by identifying resources, information, and strategies for risk reduction. The federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 requires state and local governments to develop hazard mitigation plans as a condition for federal disaster grant assistance. To prepare the plan, the Tribe organized resources, assessed risks from natural hazards, developed planning goals and objectives, reviewed mitigation alternatives, and developed an action plan to address probable impacts from natural hazards. By completing this process, the Tribe maintained compliance with the Disaster Mitigation Act, achieving eligibility for mitigation grant funding opportunities afforded under the Robert T. #### **Summary Overview of the Plan's Progress:**

The performance period for the Hazard Mitigation Plan became effective on January 12, 2021, with the final approval of the plan by FEMA. The initial performance period for this plan will be 5 years, with an anticipated update to the plan to occur before January, 2026. As of this reporting period, the performance period for this plan is considered to be 40% complete. The Hazard Mitigation Plan has targeted 27 hazard mitigation initiatives to be pursued during the 5-year- These were reviewed at the end of 2023 and some were updated and others are unchanged or still in the planning stages for the performance period. As of the reporting period, the following overall progress can be reported:

- 17 out of 27 initiatives (62.9%) reported ongoing action toward completion.
- 4 out of 27 initiatives (18.8%) were reported as being complete.
- 6 out of 27 initiatives (28.2%) reported no action taken.

#### Purpose:

The purpose of this report is to provide an annual update on the implementation of the action plan identified in the Tribe's Hazard Mitigation Plan. The objective is to ensure that there is a continuing and responsive planning process that will keep the Hazard Mitigation Plan dynamic and responsive to the needs and capabilities of the Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation. This report discusses the following:

- Natural hazard events that have occurred within the last year
- Changes in risk exposure within the planning area
- Mitigation success stories

- Review of the action plan
- Changes in capabilities that could impact plan implementation
- Recommendations for changes/enhancement.

#### The Hazard Mitigation Plan Planning Team:

The Hazard Mitigation Plan Planning Team, made up of stakeholders within the planning area, reviewed and approved this progress report at its annual meeting held on March 16, 2022. It was determined through the plan's development process that a Planning Team would remain in service to oversee maintenance of the plan. At a minimum, the Planning Team will provide technical review and oversight on the development of the annual progress report. It is anticipated that there will be turnover in the membership annually, which will be documented in the progress reports. For this reporting period, the Planning Team membership is as indicated in Table 1. For the most part, this Team also functions as the Emergency Management Advisory Group (EMAG)

#### Natural Hazard Events within the Planning Area:

During the reporting period, there were natural hazard events in the planning area that had a measurable impact on people or property. A summary of these events is as follows:

- Jan-Feb rain and ice affecting road conditions/travel
- Unhealthy air from wildfire in the region-Doty Fire
- Minor flooding from atmospheric rivers/rain-November/Dec

### **Changes in Risk Exposure in the Planning Area:**

Unhealthy air from localized and regional wildfires 2023:

Early summer, 2023 and into early fall, 2023 was eventful with many localized wildfires in the State of Washington. With some minor fires in the Grays Harbor and Thurston counties, where the majority of Tribal members live, the main impact was from smoke and conditions of the "Doty" fire located in adjacent Lewis County. Advisories were issued on several occasions and with the addition of a Air Quality measurement device, our EM department was able to keep community members abreast of any hazardous conditions. There were 23 fires at one time active in Lewis County from June to September as well as 4 fires in Grays Harbor and 6 fires in Thurston County which also contributed to unhealthy air quality- Direct risk to Tribal property was minimal.

#### January -February Ice and Rain

On January 23, 2023 the Chehalis Tribe initiated a response to icy roads and rain from several winter storms and issued advisories through the CODE RED system, as well as social media and web pages. Traction sanding and warning signs aided in keeping staff and community members aware of fall hazards. While not closing any roads, there were multiple days of icy conditions that affected travel to from the Tribe.

#### Minor flooding in November/December 2023

An atmospheric river brought large amounts of rainfall to western Washington in late November and early December this year. The flood gage on the Chehalis River near Grand mound crept up to 143.32 hitting the minor flooding status and the Black river overflowed, affecting the western part of the Tribal lands. Roads along Howanut and Elma Gate were covered with running water and temporarily impassible for several days. Only one (1) community member was relocated, due to a medical procedure, and housing was not affected in any major way. Since this report covers only until the end of 2023, the winter weather season is just beginning and there may be more water/flood issues going into 2024.

**Mitigation Success Stories:** The Emergency Management staff have competed advanced training with FEMA, in ICS and Comprehensive Emergency Management Planing systems that helps with implementation of the Continuity of Operations Plan and EOC Operations. The EOC checklist has been used in tabletop exercises and discussed at EMAG meetings- Additional food, water treatment and medical supplies have been updated and radios for emergency communication deployed. Ongoing CPR/1st aid and Active Threat Training is about 65% complete for Tribal employees and will be expanded to community members in 2024. Active education and planning for flood events have been implemented and a robust 2024 Training Calendar is planned.
