Hazard Mitigation Plan 2024 Annual Progress Report

Reporting Period: 1/2024-12/2024

Background:

The Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation developed a hazard mitigation plan to reduce risk from all hazards by identifying resources, information, and strategies for risk reduction. The federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 requires state and local governments to develop hazard mitigation plans as a condition for federal disaster grant assistance. To prepare the plan, the Tribe organized resources, assessed risks from natural hazards, developed planning goals and objectives, reviewed mitigation alternatives, and developed an action plan to address probable impacts from natural hazards. By completing this process, the Tribe maintained compliance with the Disaster Mitigation Act, achieving eligibility for mitigation grant funding opportunities afforded under the Robert T. Summary Overview of the Plan's Progress:

The performance period for the Hazard Mitigation Plan became effective on January 12, 2021, with the final approval of the plan by FEMA. The initial performance period for this plan will be 5 years, with an anticipated update to the plan to occur before January, 2026. As of this reporting period, the performance period for this plan is considered to be 65% complete. The Hazard Mitigation Plan has targeted 27 hazard mitigation initiatives to be pursued during the 5-year- These were reviewed at the end of 2024 and some were updated and others are unchanged or still in the planning stages for the performance period. As of the reporting period, the following overall progress can be reported:

- 19 out of 27 initiatives (70.37%) reported ongoing action toward completion.
- 7 out of 27 initiatives (25.92%) were reported as being complete.
- 4 out of 27 initiatives (14.81%) reported no action taken.

Purpose:

The purpose of this report is to provide an annual update on the implementation of the action plan identified in the Tribe's Hazard Mitigation Plan. The objective is to ensure that there is a continuing and responsive planning process that will keep the Hazard Mitigation Plan dynamic and responsive to the needs and capabilities of the Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation. This report discusses the following:

- Natural/manmade hazard events that have occurred within the last year
- Changes in risk exposure within the planning area
- Mitigation success stories

- Review of the action plan
- Changes in capabilities that could impact plan implementation
- Recommendations for changes/enhancement.

The Hazard Mitigation Plan Planning Team:

The Hazard Mitigation Plan Planning Team, made up of stakeholders within the planning area, reviewed and approved this progress report at its annual meeting held on Jan 29th, 2025. It was determined through the plan's development process that a Planning Team would remain in service to oversee maintenance of the plan. At a minimum, the Planning Team will provide technical review and oversight on the development of the annual progress report. It is anticipated that there will be turnover in the membership annually, which will be documented in the progress reports. For this reporting period, the Planning Team membership is as indicated in Table 1. For the most part, this Team also functions as the Emergency Management Advisory Group (EMAG)

Natural Hazard Events within the Planning Area:

During the reporting period, there were natural hazard events in the planning area that had a measurable impact on people or property. A summary of these events is as follows:

- Jan-Feb rain and ice affecting road conditions/travel
- Fallen trees in some areas blocking roads in March from Spring storm -Tree in PS Parking lot-damaged fence
- Minor flooding from atmospheric rivers/rain-November/Dec

Man made Hazard Events within the Planning Area: June

During the reporting period, there was one man made event, a train derailment, that affected access and traffic along Hwy. 12 near Elma Gate Rd. Soybean cargo, within 5 rail cars spilled content along Hwy 12. The subsequent cleanup and removal of the 5 rail cars, 1 month later, in July took 4 days and blocked traffic and access with spectators and one lane access. No damage to the Black River and estuaries

Changes in Risk Exposure in the Planning Area:

Grays Harbor and Thurston counties, where the majority of Tribal members live, had minor impact from 2024 wildfire smoke. The Tribe was able to distribute several HEPA type air filters and have reserves in place at the EM storage area and at the Elders Center

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January -February Rain

On January 15, 2024 the Chehalis Tribe initiated a response to rain from several winter storms and issued advisories through the CODE RED system, as well as social media and web pages. Warning signs aided in keeping staff and community members aware of falling tree hazards. There were 2-3 days of icy conditions that affected travel to/from the Tribe.

Water System off line-September 9-12 for 4 days

When water tanks were partially taken off line for exterior painting of the two (2) vertical tanks, in early September, water pressure dropped due to an unforeseen pipe leak and water was lost for parts of the Tribal government and community. For almost 3 days many leakages were found and valves replaced to bring water back on line. Using a backup well, and ad hoc pumps, water service was provided until repairs could be completed. Packaged water from the Public Safety Department was distributed.

Minor flooding in November/December 2024

An atmospheric river brought large amounts of rainfall to western Washington in late November and early December this year. The flood gage on the Chehalis River near Grand mound crept up to 141.6, hitting the minor flooding status and the Black river rose to 81 feet but did not overflow. Roads along Howanut and Roadhouse Rd were briefly covered with water on one side, but were still passable. Since this report covers only until the end of 2024, the winter weather season is just beginning and there may be more water/flood issues going into 2025.

Mitigation Success Stories: The Emergency Management staff have completed advanced training with FEMA, the State EMD and with our local county partners in Grays Harbor and Thurston. Staff also updated the Federal Disaster Declaration requirements for Tribal governments, as well as having our own Emergency Manager, Clint Davis, certified as a State Approved/FEMA Instructor, so he can deliver training to our own employees and staff. The EOC checklist has been updated and the EMAG group was apprised of its use in emergencies, as well as updating their COOP plan for secondary staff to fill positions when primaries are down, out of area, or not available Additional food, water treatment and medical supplies have been updated and temp shelter plans are in process for testing and expansion. New waterless sandbags have been tested and obtained to provide quick response to water emergencies and minor flooding around building entrances. Ongoing CPR/1st aid and Active Threat Training is about 85% complete for Tribal employees and will continue to be expanded to community members in 2025. Active education and planning for flood events have been implemented and a robust 2025 Training Calendar is planned.
